12 System Physical Examination (2x a year for Life): A thorough physical exam can be more important than vaccinations. Examinations are the time for a veterinarian to catch illnesses early such as dental disease, ear infections, skin cancer, arthritis, cardiac disease, and many other disease processes. However, not all diseases are detectable on physical exam. That is why UVH recommends annual baseline wellness blood work (chemistry and complete blood count) along with analysis of your pet's urine. This will give us the chance to not only examine the outside, but also the inner workings of your pet. These baseline tests are strongly recommended for any pet over the age of 5. If your pet is on chronic medications or has been diagnosed with a condition, we may monitor these values more frequently.

REMINDERS: 1. Please bring in a fresh fecal sample (at least 1-2 tsp) for an Intestinal Parasite Screen. 2. Don't forget to Microchip. 3. Don't forget to refill your heartworm, flea, and tick prevention.
